The art of good kitchen design

We occupy our kitchens, as we do the rest of our homes, mostly on autopilot, the experience of being there so familiar we don't analyse it. We should though and preferably with the help of someone who has made this their profession. Real kitchen design is creative as well as highly practical. It goes way beyond sales and the over-familiar rule of the working triangle.

Johnny Grey is a British designer, author and educator specialising in kitchens. He has been prominent in kitchen design since the 1980s, aiming to make kitchens the sociable heart of the home.



The kitchen is the most intensively used room in the home. The smaller the space the more high-performance it needs to be. Every user has his or her own specific priorities. Culinary habits and cooking techniques are personal and shared use is more complicated than access to appliances and work surfaces. Add to that time spent in the kitchen doing homework or office work and what you have is a multipurpose hybrid space. Another definition of the kitchen is a living room in which you cook.

The ultimate goal is to create a friendly, functional and personalised kitchen with space planning as key. This takes skill. When first visiting a client, a good kitchen designer will enjoy brainstorming ideas and at times question the client's brief, including the magazine images that don't necessarily make a good match with the space under discussion. The difference between a designer and a salesperson is the ability to say no

when necessary – while also of course forming a close collaborative relationship with the client. Both require confidence combined with knowledge. In general, independent kitchen retailers have more skill with design than sales staff in large chains. When choosing one of these firms it is worth asking to see completed projects and talking to their customers.

Good kitchen design will also involve integrating non-culinary features of the space - views to the garden, position of the table, architectural details, perching places, potential for users' eye contact, artworks perhaps – with the practical functions of the kitchen. These are of course crucial. Together with the client, the designer needs to identify the 'sweet spot', i.e. the best place to cook and prepare food. This commanding position should ideally face into the room and is often found in front of a central island, or peninsula in a smaller kitchen, with the sink cabinet behind.

Caesarstone produces designs across a wide spectrum from marble inspired designs through to concrete-like urban aesthetics.

The material chosen for the worktop is key for determining the overall kitchen aesthetic and, perhaps more critically, the quality of the worksurface material will affect the surface durability as well as whether it retains its long-term beauty. Alongside this, countertop height, location and size are key organising tools available to kitchen designers. By rationalising each task's work area it is possible to shorten walking distance, improve flow and leave space for social furniture like a decent sized table, sofa or other vintage piece that gives the comforting sense of the kitchen being a furnished room. Deployment of these requires knowledge of ergonomics, relating the measurements and workings of the human body to the dimensions of the furniture. To ensure users can move easily around the room 'soft geometry', such as curved shapes, can be applied where needed. A designer can also bring in accessible design for all ages and abilities by applying safety mechanisms and specialised storage systems.

There is art and science in kitchen design. At its best it respects the architecture of your home, makes cooking a pleasure and encourages conviviality. There is a great deal more to it than the ability to sell a long run of cabinets.







Where to spend and where to save to get your dream kitchen

Planning your kitchen is possibly one of the most exciting parts of designing your home. It's also one of the highest budget installations and a project that shouldn't be undertaken lightly. The decisions we make form part of the bones of our home so we need to think long term and sustainably when making the choices that will form our new spaces. Designing your own kitchen is a true passion project, a project in which you can really expand on your ideas and create a room that ticks all of your boxes. Being involved in the process means that you are able to be in control of the build every step of the way, adding your own design ideas to ensure that the finished product is very much the room of your dreams. It can also be a challenge - there's so much to think about, so many considerations and costs - so it's important to plan well and consider all the options.

So where to start?

We are surrounded by inspiration but nailing down your own core style can be a little difficult when we are bombarded from all sides with trends. What's hot and what's not? 


O1. Take your time and don't compromise

02. Evolving design

Caesarstone was the first brand to develop engineered quartz surfaces in the late 1980s, in response to the inherent failings that people found with natural stone, which can be prone to cracks, staining and require regular resealing. In the 1990s, quartz surfaces came in an array of mostly plain and sometimes fairly 'vibrant' colours, and often included 'mirror chips' in the finished surface.

As the surface industry grew, designs got more sophisticated. In another first, Caesarstone began to design and craft surfaces with a wholly more natural feel and the brand started work on the Supernatural Collection around 2010. Caesarstone was crafting stone surfaces that looked

as good as or better than quarried granite, marble, or travertine, while also outperforming them.

Caesarstone's contemporary collection of surfaces contain some of the most coveted designs available; Statuario Maximus can be found on many Instagram influencers' kitchen island. Empira White and White Attica are equally unique and sought after along with several designs from the unique Metropolitan Collection; Cloudburst Concrete amongst the prettiest, while Rugged Concrete serves up a more robust flavour. The newly launched Porcelain collection offers another leap forward in design with striking bold-veined designs such as Smokestone and Sleet.




03. Making your choice

Premium designed surfaces can be hard to choose from just a small sample or a single picture. Their colour tones elegantly change and, like the pattern, can differ across the width and height of the 3m x 1.4m slab. This finished effect of these highly organic styles when installed is stunning. However, it makes it worthwhile to employ several different tools when choosing your perfect design.

Within this Swatch Book, you will find pictures of each surface in the Caesarstone range. Each product has two pictures; the smaller shows a close up of the pattern while the larger one shows the full slab, which is at least 3.04m x 1.44m.

Once you've honed your choices down to one or two favourites, you can order samples from the Caesarstone website. These can give you a great idea of the texture and tone of the surface and work well alongside the images within the Swatch Book.



Caesarstone UK has two showrooms, one in North London and one in Manchester. You can see much larger displays of our surface Collections, as well as chat to one of our consultants. 

Hands on with nature

Caesarstone's Head of Design, Mor Krisher, describes the design process behind every Caesarstone surface and the creation of the new Pebbles Collection.

With every new product, our design process begins with the same consideration; an exploration of the world outside our window. Whether it is the motion and beauty of a changing coastline, the stillness and calm of the desert landscape, or the urban textures and patinas seen in our towns and cities, it is crucial for us to experience and observe the world around us.

It's no surprise that nature inspires so much of what we do as a design team. We benefit from spectacular surroundings – stunning desert landscapes, sheer mountain faces to coastlines and archaeological reminders of classical antiquity – all within a short drive of our design facilities. We are surrounded by the beauty of the natural world.

This awe-inspiring environment helps us develop our product collections, including an expansive suite of white surfaces that provide customers with a beautiful and durable alternative to marble. Central to our design philosophy is our interpretive approach of the natural world. How can the patterns, textures and movements we see in the world around us be transformed into something unique and individual?

This can certainly be evidenced in Layalite, one of our more recent designs, which evokes a

blanket of snow slowly melting away to reveal the complexities of underlying metamorphic rock. Much like no quarried slab is alike, all of the white marble motifs within our range are inimitable with their own influences and creative journeys. All of these surfaces are made from the continued search for inspiration in the external environment and the delicate craftmanship of human intervention.

Similarly, whilst creating the darker colours throughout our collection we turned our attention to the surrounding desert landscapes where natural stones are scorched by day and frozen by night, weathered by this endless cycle to produce the most wonderful patinas and textures. We studied a huge variety of black and dark stones, and they all had their own characters, some very simple and minimalist and some that were full of detail and vibrancy. They all evoked different feelings within the design team; some stones felt naturally warm and comforting, while others had patterns and texture that felt epic in scale, reminiscent of the vast and rugged landscape from which they came. Our latest dark colour, Darcrest, is inspired by our exploration of the dispersal of minerals during the formations of mountains and ridges over eons of time. Each design brings a striking organic appeal into the home and connects us to the nuance and power of nature.









Homeowners yearn for a reminder of the natural world, a continuous link between interior and exterior spaces, reflected in the choice of earthy patterns, textures and tones becoming more popular. Recent events have helped us to comprehend where we stand in relation to nature, and we all desire a closer link with the outside world.

As we turned to the humble pebble, we recognise that within each stone there is a history of both the power and subtlety of the elements, a record of these transformative processes that can be felt in the palm of your hand. Each stone is shaped by the ceaseless motion of water and wind, earth and sun. Under the impact of these great forces, the pebble becomes soft and smooth to the human touch, yet under careful observation, this modest stone reveals subtle veins or capillaries and gentle tonal shifts, hinting at the intricacies found in nature. The soft sediments trace the flow of time and impact of these elements.

The contrast and balance between simplicity and complexity in the pebble captivated us, forming the inspiration behind our new Pebbles Collection. As we picked pebbles from the riverbank, we noticed the individuality of each of these countless stones. The tactility, form and tones may differ, but each evoke the sensation of a natural journey.

Central to the appeal of every Caesarstone product is the careful intervention of human craftmanship and a keen consideration of design applied to these creative references. This is our signature touch which offers the necessary refinement of each product, until we have the perfect worktop for the heart of your home.

Caesarstone Porcelain; a new point of view

Caesarstone began designing and manufacturing worksurfaces in 1987, the pioneers of quartz worktops, their surface expertise and premium brand is known around the world. Caesarstone Porcelain arrives after an intensive two-year research and design programme in which the brand focused more than three decades of stone surfaces experience in the creation of the brand's inaugural suite of porcelain surfaces.

A brand synonymous with design, Caesarstone Porcelain presents a remarkable new aesthetic that is redefining kitchen countertops, with richer colours, bolder designs, larger patterns, and wonderful tactile textures. The new range contains more than 20 unique designs, all of which align to one of Caesarstone's current collections; The Metropolitan Collection – a diverse suite of designs that celebrates the industrial aesthetic; The Supernatural Collection as perfect kitchen worktop surfaces, and – a comprehensive group of evocative surfaces inspired by the limitless beauty of nature; and The Classico Collection – elegant shades that provide a classic foundation for any interior.

Quartz and porcelain are the two fastest growing categories of kitchen worktops in the UK and Caesarstone is the only company to offer both materials under one brand.

Porcelain surfaces are sometimes described in the market as ceramic, sintered stone, compact or ultra-compact material. They blend ceramic clays, other natural materials and mineral colourings which are then pressed. The design is then printed on the surface before the slab is fired.

Quartz surfaces, sometimes described as engineered stone, are a blend of quartz minerals and other natural materials with polymers and pigments. These are then moulded, compressed, and heated to form

The final look and technical performance of either porcelain or quartz surfaces is based on the quality of the raw materials, as well as the expertise and capabilities employed in crafting them. Caesarstone considers both manufactures its surfaces with high quality raw materials, via a meticulous and innovative process, honed over the last three decades. The resulting products both offer industry leading aesthetics with exceptional durability, backed by a lifetime warranty.



How do you buy it?

Caesarstone slabs are extremely large and heavy, not dissimilar to a piece of quarried marble or granite. They need to be handled and cut by professional stone masons or fabricators using specialist machinery.

Fabricators, experts in kitchen countertops, will know how best to template, cut and install Caesarstone worktops for this particular type of installation. They will also know how to make the most of the design that you have picked, matching patterns across joins, backsplashes, and upstands, for example.

If you are working with a kitchen studio then they will most likely organise the fabrication of your Caesarstone worktop for you as part of the overall project. Most good independent kitchen studios use Caesarstone products in their designs and will already work closely with one or two fabricators.

However, if you are managing your own kitchen renovation project and sourcing your worktop directly, then Caesarstone can help you find a good stonemason or fabricator in your area – visit the 'See & Buy' section of the UK website. You can also request a quote from local suppliers. Your fabricator will be able to advise you on how to level your cabinetry in preparation for the Caesarstone top and on any specific design features.


As with any building project, it is advisable to get several quotes. Prices can vary depending on the types of stone that fabricators promote so it's worth making sure that alternative materials that you may be offered meet the same high standards of Caesarstone.

Caesarstone products are incredibly durable and non-porous, making them virtually maintenance-free. Unlike granite or marble surfaces, they don't require sealing. For the majority of kitchen spills a little bit of soap and warm water is all that is required to keep them hygienic, clean, and looking their best. 



Anatomy of a worktop



These are some of the most popular kitchen layouts, with something to suit most spaces.



Surface finishes

Caesarstone has expanded its line of finish options to include the rich layered looks of Concrete and Rough along with our sleek, standard Polished finish. These matte, textured surface designs are of the same high-quality as the Polished finish, yet present the option of a sensorial dimension with low sheen to satisfy different design styles.



01. Polished

Effortlessly elegant, this high gloss polish brings out the best in the colour by emphasising its features in high definition. This finish reflects light and illuminates spaces, naturally making them look larger.



02 Hope

Our Honed Finish is a low gloss satin, combining the modesty of matte with the sophistication of very subtle shine and a texture that is silky and soft to the touch.



03. Natural

This slightly textured finish conjures up the emotional caress of stone, adding warmth to the grain and a uniquely sensorial touch. Its satin sheen gently reflects light, enhancing depth of colour, especially on darker shades.



04. Concrete

This sleek matte finish is inspired by the tactile nature of smooth concrete. Its granular aspects stimulate the fingers, creating the sensation of a lively organic material.



05. Rough concrete

This unique and highly advanced finish offers a truly rugged and tactile experience: a surface that is distinctively rough, yet smooth enough for easy cleaning. Light plays across the dramatic surface texture bringing out the depth of colour.




06. Ultra Rough

Our most tactile finish, Ultra Rough, is a breakthrough innovation designed exclusively to bring a unique granular touch to porcelain. By adding a dimension of materiality that is authentic to patinas found on crude rocks, natural marbles, and industrial metals or concrete, light reflected from each surface enhances its organic nuances while ensuring the highest durability for ease of care.

Caesarstone finishes other than Polished may need a little more daily maintenance due to their unique patterns and finishes.

Cutting a slab for a U-shaped kitchen

This example shows how a single slab of Caesarstone might be cut for a compact U-shaped kitchen, showing a cut-out for a hob, whilst allowing for a 100mm upstand around the entire length of the work surface and a 10mm overhang.





Care & Maintenance

Cleaning

Everyday Cleaning

- Just use water and a mild detergent or a spray-and-wipe type cleaner on a soft cloth or non-abrasive scourer. Then rinse with water and dry with a soft cloth or paper towel.
- Wipe up wet spills to prevent limescale forming.
- Check each cleaning product first on an inconspicuous area to ensure that it doesn't damage the surface.

Stubborn Stains

- Gently rub the area with an approved cleaner and a soft cloth or paper towel.
- Clean a larger area than the stain itself using circular motions.
- Rinse with water and dry with a soft cloth or paper towel.
- Repeat the process if you still see the stain.

Dried Spills

 Carefully scrape away dried material such as food, gum or nail polish with a plastic putty knife and then clean the surface with a damp cloth.

Metal Marks

• Metal objects such as knives, metal pots, keys and belt buckles can sometimes leave metal residue on the surface. This is easy to remove as described in 'Stubborn Stains', or by rubbing gently with a latex eraser.

Limescale

• Pour white vinegar on the limescale and leave it to soak for 30 minutes. Rub gently with a non-scratch scourer using wide strokes, then rinse with plenty of water. If necessary, repeat until the limescale is removed.

Rust Marks

- Place a small amount of Bar Keepers Friend® Cleanser (powder) on a damp cloth. Do not use an abrasive scourer. Wipe very gently in a circular motion. Rinse thoroughly with warm water and dry with a soft cloth or paper towel.
- Follow these instructions carefully to avoid damaging the surface.

Surface care

Surface Finishes

 Caesarstone finishes other than Polished may need a little more daily maintenance due to their unique patterns and finishes.

Scratch Resistance

• Caesarstone surfaces are scratch resistant. However, avoid using sharp objects such as knives or screwdrivers directly on the surface – always use a cutting board.

Heat Resistance

 Sudden and extreme heat, as well as prolonged or direct heat, can damage all natural stone surfaces, including Caesarstone, especially close to edges. Therefore, always place hot cookware or cooking units such as electric frying pans, crock pots or toaster ovens on trivets, and not directly on the Caesarstone surface.

Dark Surfaces

- Dark surfaces, objects and furniture are characteristically more prone to showing fingerprints and other signs of daily living than light surfaces. As such, dark Caesarstone models may need a little more daily maintenance.
- Dark Caesarstone models, as all dark surfaces, tend to be more sensitive to scratch marks. It is therefore important to protect the surface from sharp objects by using a cutting board.
- Limescale may be more visible on dark models than light models so liquid should not be left to dry out on the surface.
- Use of cream-textured cleaning products is not recommended on dark surfaces.
